A Place Where Legends Are Made


WEP—A place where legends are made!

We welcome all to come and witness the Purvis Primary Robots in action during the 2018 Purvis Primary Science Fair on February 21, 2018.





Promoting Alternative Thinking Strategies



At Heron Bay Primary School students are learning to understand emotions (feelings, behaviours and relationships), self-control and interpersonal problem solving skills, all of which are necessary as they develop into adulthood. These are learned through the PATHS Program—Promoting Alternative Thinking Strategies.

One of the many daily activities students are engaging in is the **PATHS KID OF THE DAY**. Each day a different PATHS Kid is selected and highlighted in class where he or she is complimented by classmates and the classroom teacher. Once the PATHS Kid's classmates and peers compliment him or her, he or she must also reflect on his or her strengths by giving himself or herself a compliment. This builds self-esteem in students as well as helps students to see the positive in him or her as well as others.

The PATHS Kid is awarded something special so that he or she can visibly be identified by all students and staff of the school allowing for more compliments by other students, staff members or visitors to the school.

The PATHS Kid can be identified by wearing a sticker or banner labeled PATHS KID OF THE DAY, wearing a tiara or for younger students carrying a stuffed animal or wearing the “turtle” shell for the day.

The PATHS Kid is also given the opportunity to choose special rewards along with additional special recognition by the teacher and principal such as having lunch with the principal or eating at a table set with china ware, just to name a few.

The PATHS Kid activity allows for every student to be the PATHS KID OF THE DAY throughout the school year. A student complimenting their peers daily has created a more positive school environment.
